RACHEL COOPER 9.30AM - 11.30AM

Born in the Southwest of England, Rachel Cooper started the violin aged 4. She went onto study Music at the University of Chichester where she gained First Class Honours in Violin Performance. After moving to London in 2012 Rachel took up her Masters degree in Music Performance Science at the Royal College of Music graduating in 2014 with Distinction. It was during her Masters that Rachel's interest in Music Education Research grew, writing her thesis on the importance of informative music education for young people, in which she used her own residential summer music course as her case study.

Since graduating from her Masters at the Royal College of Music, Rachel has built up a varied portfolio of teaching, performing, research and outreach projects. Rachel is a trained Suzuki Violin teacher working as a Violin/Viola and Chamber Music Coach at Guildhall School of Music and Drama Junior Department, Violin teacher for Music Masters, and a Violin Coach/lecturer for Nicola Benedetti's education initiative: Benedetti Foundation. Many of Rachel's students go onto study at Junior Music Colleges in London.

Rachel is also a Lecturer and Mentor on a number of Degree courses including a PGCEi course which provides instruction to violinists in group instrumental teaching in association with Music Masters and Birmingham University. In January 2023 Rachel joined the faculty at Wells Cathedral School as Junior String Coordinator where she has created a string program in the Pre-Prep school. Rachel is regularly invited to give masterclasses across Europe including Germany, Latvia, Lithuania, Denmark and Belgium. Rachel has played with a number of freelance ensembles and has recently done a recording for Decca Classics with the Benedetti Foundation. Each summer Rachel runs a string course called VIVAStrings in Wiltshire for 8–15-year-olds.

SESSION DETAILS

Dr Liz Stafford is director of global music education consultancy company Music Education Solutions®, editor of Primary Music Magazine, and author of The Primary Music Leader's Handbook (HarperCollins). She has over 25 years' experience as a teacher in music service and school settings and is a former member of the leadership team of the DfE's national training programme for whole class instrumental teachers in England, the KS2 Music CPD Programme (2007-2011). She was Senior Lecturer in Music Education at Leeds Conservatoire for 6 years until 2021.

SESSION DETAILS

Engaging and Motivating Children and Schools through First Experiences

In this session you will explore how to engage and motivate children through a holistic approach to whole class instrumental teaching. You will learn how to use extrinsic and intrinsic motivators to manage behaviour and encourage progress, and how to engage with schools to embed the work you do into the musical life of the school and encourage take up at pathways level.

SESSION DETAILS

Equity, Diversity & Inclusion in Action - The ABC of EDI

During the day, Sam will cover key principles in equity, diversity and inclusive practice, debunk common myths and ideas and provide clarity of what equity, diversity and inclusion actually is and what it looks like in practice. We will explore why inclusion starts with creating an environment where this practice can succeed and what outcomes we should be aiming for over the next 2-3 years. The day will cover a whole range of contexts that music teachers will find beneficial including group discussion and debate and approaches to communication, which are integral to an inclusive and respectful staff and student community.

There will also be:

- Opportunity for group discussion and awareness raising around issues of ED&I with opportunities for participants to learn, share and grow.
- A chance to review current knowledge and engage in individual reflection
- Space to address challenges in EDI and consider actions people can take as individuals and collectively
- Tips for identifying strategic EDI priorities and how they align with the National Plan for Music in Wales

Lucy Clement-Evans is a qualified Dalcroze Eurhythmics and Kodály practitioner who specialises in working with children under the age of 7 years old. She enjoys helping children to learn about music while singing, moving and having lots of fun!

Lucy has worked part-time for Codi'r To, Sistema Cymru since 2016, and is responsible for the musicianship work with the children from nursery to Year 2. She also works as a freelance education practitioner for Ensemble Cymru leading projects in schools across North Wales. Lucy provides the music lectures for BA Education and PGCE students at Bangor University.

Originally from Birmingham, Lucy has lived in Wales since 1996. She graduated from Bangor University with a BMus and MA and plays the piano and clarinet. In 2002 Lucy was awarded a Winston Churchill Travel Scholarship to investigate Interactive Music Education in America, Germany and Luxembourg. In 2003 she received a Professional Development Certificate "Music in the Early Year (Kodály) which has formed the foundation for her work















to the present day. She loves to learn and was awarded her Certificate in Dalcroze Eurhythmics in 2018! In 2022, Lucy passed her Level 2 Professional Development Certificate in Primary Music Education (Kodály) with high distinction.

SESSION DETAILS

Introduction to music in the early years

Lucy's session will be a general introduction to making music with young children. There will be lots of practical activities including songs, rhymes and movement. The session will explore:

- Musical beginnings
- Using the voice
- Introducing musical elements
- Listening and responding to music and musicians
